How much are families paying for child care?



MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: \$96,179

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care

-  Home-based: **\$13,728**
-  Center-based: **\$16,460**

This is **14% - 17%** of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

-  Home-based: **\$11,809**
-  Center-based: **\$12,294**

This is **12% - 13%** of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: \$15,677
