How much are families paying for child care?



MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: **\$127,420**

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care

-  Home-based: **\$17,571**
-  Center-based: **\$22,340**

This is **14% - 18%** of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

-  Home-based: **\$15,070**
-  Center-based: **\$16,632**

This is **12% - 13%** of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: **\$15,677**
