MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: **\$84,607**

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care

 Home-based: **\$13,613**

 Center-based: **\$16,307**

This is **16% - 19%** of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

 Home-based: **\$11,454**

 Center-based: **\$14,725**

This is **14% - 17%** of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: **\$15,677**
