MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME: **\$116,247**

INFANT: Average annual price of licensed care

 Home-based: **\$12,768**

 Center-based: **\$20,548**

This is **11% - 18%** of a family's income.

PRESCHOOLER: Average annual price of licensed care

 Home-based: **\$11,356**

 Center-based: **\$16,236**

This is **10% - 14%** of a family's income.

The cost of center care rivals college tuition: **\$15,677**
